



2023 Scholarship Budget:

The (draft) 2023 Scholarship Budget (updated April 19, 2022) is attached. The budget is based on funding from the NMGS Foundation of \$50,000. 



Revenue: Gas Well Revenues




Budgets: \$\$ for Student and Foundation Support




Budgets: 2016 Revenue

Revenue: Gas Revenues vs Natural Gas Prices




